Education with purpose

It's not just about finding a job or learning a skill. It's about what you care about – whether that's building or creating a career, revitalizing your community or caring for others.

Flexible program options

Certificate

An accelerated program that typically takes one year to complete – perfect for starting your career or building your knowledge.

Diploma

A credential that delves into more advanced studies that usually takes two years to complete.

Degree

Often referred to as a “bachelor’s degree,” these four-year programs combine practical and academic concepts to enhance your career and learning opportunities.

Trades foundation

A one-year certificate program that covers the basic skills and knowledge you need to work in the trades. An employer sponsor is not needed; you’ll complete this program in class.

Trades apprenticeship training

Advanced technical training that combines time spent working in the industry under employer supervision with in-class technical training. Your NIC classes will usually last between four and 10 weeks per level.

Self-declaring as an Indigenous student

By self-declaring your ancestry, you can access a wider range of supports, services and awards, including scholarships and bursaries. Self-declaring is totally voluntary and 100% free.

Priority admission

Interested in starting a trades or health care career? As an Indigenous student, you may be eligible for a priority seat in a wide range of programs. No proof of ancestry is required.

Academic calendar

Our full list of NIC courses.

Academic schedules and deadlines

A list of dates and deadlines that affect students.

Add/drop period

The short time at the beginning of the term when you can change the courses you're registered in without a penalty. The deadline will be listed in the academic schedule.

Admission requirements

The conditions you need to meet to be admitted into a program.

Award

Financial support for your educational journey that you don't have to pay back. Common examples include scholarships and bursaries.

Part-time v.s. full-time students

Full-time students are enrolled in at least nine credits per term; part-time students are enrolled in fewer.

Pre-requisite

A course you need to complete before another course can be taken.

Registration

Signing up for a course and reserving your seat.

Sponsorship

Ongoing financial support from an outside organization to help you pay for your education (eg. your local council).

Term/semester

The part of the year in which you'll study. For example, a one-year program will typically be completed over two terms – a fall term and a winter term.

Transcript

An official, permanent record of your completed courses and the mark you received for each.

Tuition

The cost of taking a course.

Tuition deposit

A non-refundable part of your tuition that you'll need to pay before starting college classes.
