



## Inflation, inflation

You may have noticed a slight change in our fee structure. We've recently made some minor changes to how we calculate course fees. In the past, the formula was loosely based on the number of hours of instruction, however to simplify things, we have adopted the following pricing structure:

1. Course fees are based on the number of classes in a course regardless of the length of class.

2. A single class course will be \$15, and each additional class will add \$5 to the course fee, to a maximum of \$45.

In most cases, courses will be the same or lower cost compared to previous sessions.
